The Beginning

As we look ahead to the new year, it's nice sometime to take a look back to see what we have accomplished. While pondering year's past, I came across this article on how our organization began. Kaye Schnell was nice enough to put this little history lesson together for us.

Suzanne McMillan, who is a Life Member, was the

founder of Holly berry Quilt Guild.. Suzanne, along with several of her quilting friends, decided that they would like to meet and quilt together and enjoy each other's company. She asked the Administration of the Barnstable County Fairgrounds if it would be possible to meet in their conference room and permission was granted in 1985. An announcement was placed in the local papers that a meeting would be held and that all interested quilters would be welcome. Approximately 18 people answered.

For the first six months, the quilters met every two weeks and worked on their own projects and helped

each other with problems. It soon became apparent that some order needed to be established, as, at each meeting, someone new would appear.

After much discussion, it was decided to become a non-profit organization and Suzanne was elected the first president of the Holly Berry Quilt Guild. The first Executive Board Meeting was held in January of 1986, and the rest is history, recorded in our Secretary's record book.

Recipe Corner

Cranberry Coleslaw

1 1/4 cups whole fresh cranberries, chopped
1/3 cup sugar
1 small bunch fresh broccoli, florets only
4 cups shredded red cabbage
1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts or pecans
1/2 cup raisins
1 small onion, finely minced

Dressing:

1 cup mayonnaise
1/3 cup sugar
2 tsp. vinegar

Combine cranberries and sugar and mix. Add remaining ingredients, cover and refrigerate overnight. Optional: Just before serving, you add 8 slices of cooked and crumbled bacon, or 1/4 to 1/3 cup baco-bits.

Tips and Tricks

A Washing Caution

Tip a Day Calendar

Avoid using fabric softener in the washer or dryer when you pre-wash fabrics that you later intend to fuse. Fusable web will not adhere properly to fabrics treated with fabric softener.

Bag Handles

After making many quilted bags, I have discovered how to make the perfect handle. I wrap a strip of fabric around non-roll elastic and topstitch it down both sides and in the center.

Accidents Happen

Tip a Day Calendar

If you have accidentally fused an appliqué in the wrong place, use a fabric softener dryer sheet as a pressing cloth to loosen the web so you can remove the appliqué to reposition it.

- 6 yds. of binding for handle
- Sewing machine
